Jingle Bells with 2 hands!! Playing with both hands at the same time can be tricky. It's best to get really good with each hand separately before trying to play them together. Thankfully, this version of Jingle Bells has the right and left hand playing the same notes - so the melody should sound the same whichever hand you use. The only difference will be that the Right Hand part sounds higher, and the Left Hand part sounds lower.

Take it nice and slow!



There is another thing here that may be new. The repeat sign means to repeat the song from the beginning. As for the lines that say 1 and 2...

1.

This means to play the measures under the lines with a 1 on the first playthrough.

2.

This means to play the measures under the lines with a 2 on the second playthrough, and to skip the measure under the lines with a 1.
